1.1	What progress have you made on your Inclusive data priorities/ IDC Action Plan priorities in the past year?	Include examples to accompany any highlights or achievements.	In January 2022, ONS published the Inclusive Data Taskforce Implementation Plan. The Implementation Plan summarises known current and planned initiatives to improve data inclusivity across the UK statistical system. Since then, examples of our achievements included the following:  • An ONS Assembly has been established to increase engagement with charities and bodies that represent the interests of marginalised or under-represented groups of the population.	

			<ul> <li>A new independent National Statistician's         Advisory Committee on Inclusive Data has been launched to advise on priorities, ongoing improvements and evaluate progress towards the Inclusive Data Taskforce recommendations in an ongoing way.</li> <li>A programme of qualitative research is underway to examine the lived experiences of groups identified by the Inclusive Data Taskforce as currently under-represented in UK data and evidence.</li> <li>Review of harmonised standards related to equalities have been prioritised and progressed ensuring these are in line with changing social norms. New standards have been published for 'previous UK armed forces service' and 'Welsh language skills' and updated standard/guidance has been published for national identity, religion, ethnicity and qualifications.</li> <li>A new survey was conducted and findings published on disabled people's access to goods and services, with lived experience insights from qualitative research published soon afterwards.</li> <li>We have been collaborating with other government departments and the Devolved Administrations of Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales to produce systemic change across the whole of the UK.</li> </ul>

The Plan will be reviewed, and updated versions will be published annually to ensure it reflects current society and continually drives progress.

We have worked with other government departments and organisations across the UK to join up work across the UK. We have also shared details of the IDTF ambitions with colleagues internationally including at the UNECE Expert Meeting on Statistical Data Collection, 26-28 October, and at the UN Expert Group Meeting on Harnessing data by citizens for public policy and SDG monitoring: a conceptual framework, 10-11 November. We are exploring the possibility of a new United Nations City Group on inclusivity which would allow greater international engagement and sharing of practices.
