1.1	What progress have you made on your Inclusive data priorities/ IDC Action Plan priorities in the past year?	Include examples to accompany any highlights or achievements.	Over the past year, Data2X advanced inclusive data priorities by strengthening gender data systems, promoting time use data for policymaking, and embedding intersectionality and responsible data governance into global and national agendas. Through the Gender Data Network (GDN), we expanded membership, hosted learning exchanges, and supported Sri Lanka’s NSO in implementing the BRIDGE Tool, laying the foundation for its first gender statistics strategy. We also deepened regional engagement with ECLAC and ESCAP to scale inclusive data practices across Latin America and Asia-Pacific. Our advocacy and programmatic work translated data into action through global climate negotiations, national policy dialogues, and

			<p>practical tools. Highlights include publishing the Valuing Women’s Time advocacy toolkit, hosting skills-building workshops and media roundtables in Kenya, and convening the third macroeconomic policy and time use roundtable. We launched the Data for Democracy brief at HLPF, influenced UNFCCC’s Gender Action Plan negotiations, and advanced feminist data governance through data cooperative case studies and UNGA convenings. Key achievements: Gender Data Network expansion: Added new countries, held regional workshops, and supported Sri Lanka’s BRIDGE Tool assessment to inform its gender statistics strategy. Time Use advocacy and uptake: Published toolkit, hosted workshops and media roundtables, and convened the third macroeconomic policy roundtable in Nairobi. Global advocacy wins: Influenced UNFCCC Gender Action Plan draft text and launched the Data for Democracy brief to link gender data with democratic resilience. Responsible data governance: Advanced data cooperatives through case studies and high-level convenings at CSW and UNGA.</p>
1.2	<p>What areas of your Inclusive data priorities/ IDC Action Plan have you made the least progress on, in the past year?</p>	<p>Include any challenges or barriers faced.</p>	<p>Progress has been slower in: Sustained country-level implementation at scale, due to capacity constraints, funding limitations, and frequent turnover within government counterparts. Systematic integration of gender data into national AI and digital public infrastructure strategies, where policy frameworks are still evolving. Key barriers include: Shrinking development finance for gender data in some contexts. Competing political and economic priorities at the country level. Limited technical capacity in advanced data systems and AI governance in some partner countries.</p>

Over the past year, Data2X's priorities have increasingly emphasized: The intersection of gender data and artificial intelligence. A sharper focus on country-owned gender data systems rather than only global indicators
