1.1	What progress have you made on your Inclusive data priorities/ IDC Action Plan priorities in the past year?	Include examples to accompany any highlights or achievements.	Over the past year, we submitted our IDC Action Plan and continued advancing our Inclusive Data priorities through active engagement with the Collaborative on Citizen Data, especially in its working groups on impact stories and intersectionality, as well as through participation in the UN Expert Group on Citizen Data processes. These spaces have allowed us to share lessons from Ecuador and help shape emerging guidance on citizen-generated data. At regional and national levels, we continue to promote a Latin American agenda on LGBTIQ+ data together with partners such as Sil Violencia, Colombia Diversa and GPSDD, while

			expanding citizen-generated data initiatives with youth and LGBTIQ+ populations in Ecuador. We are also exploring collaboration with the Government of Ecuador around the forthcoming national policy for LGBTIQ+ populations, positioning inclusive citizen data as a key input for its design.
1.2	What areas of your Inclusive data priorities/ IDC Action Plan have you made the least progress on, in the past year?	Include any challenges or barriers faced.	In the past year, the areas where we have made the least progress are those related to the development of ethical guidelines, the standardized inclusion template, and the broader communication and advocacy products outlined in our IDC Action Plan. While we have initiated a few preliminary steps, full implementation has not yet begun. This is mainly because these activities require coordination, community validation, and dedicated resources, which we are now integrating into our 2026 institutional planning. Our intention is to begin structured development of these components next year to ensure they are aligned with organizational priorities and national processes.

This process has introduced new conversations on data disaggregation, ethical data practices, and the inclusion of sexual and gender diversity in local evidence and policymaking.

3.1	What are your priorities for your IDC action plan / inclusive data work in the next 12 months?		<p>In the next 12 months, our priorities focus on accelerating the implementation of our IDC Action Plan. We will continue advancing inclusive LGBTIQ+ data, both through our collaboration on the National Policy for LGBTIQ+ Populations (Ecuador) and through subnational initiatives such as the LGBTIQ+ living-conditions survey in Manabí. Strengthening ethical, intersectional and community-driven approaches will remain central to this work.</p> <p>We also plan to deepen our engagement in citizen-generated data, particularly through the Collaborative on Citizen Data, contributing to the intersectionality workstream and supporting the development of tools that help CSOs produce more inclusive and actionable data. Finally, we will integrate these efforts into our 2026 institutional planning—expanding training, ethical guidelines, and communication practices that make inclusive data more visible and useful for decision-making.</p>
