| | | | Planning for detailed research to gather inclusive data in relation to the identified priorities is now underway, and the findings will be added to a repository of data that is being used for external and internal communications, advocacy, and programme learning. |
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| | | | LLNOB (Learning to Leave No one Behind) has completed its first phase and the key learnings from this have been documented. Our programmes in the five Asian countries in which this project was piloted are exploring how best to scale up/replicate or otherwise act on the learning from the initiatives piloted. Three examples are: Myanmar: We are advocating for health services that are more responsive to the needs of LGBT+ individuals based on evidence gathered by our civil society partners. UK: We are planning a learning event to disseminate findings from a regional research that examined data evidencing barriers to achieve SDG targets faced by people affected by caste discrimination. India: We will continue to develop a methodology piloted to enable grassroots organisations to gather data about the situation of marginalised women. |
| 1.2 | What areas of your IDC action plan have you made the least progress on, in the past year? | Include any challenges or barriers faced. This can also include any COVID-19 related reflections | The initial timeline for the ECID baseline activities had planned for the data collection to be conducted between mid-February and end of April 2020, enabling the interim report to be shared on March 31st and the validation activities to happen before the final report was shared at the end of June. However, the COVID-19 pandemic impacted the baseline activities and required methodologies to be reviewed in all three countries, either |

| 1.2 | | Man | in terms of data collection or in terms of data validation. As ECID has not been able to access communities and gather groups of people, much of the validation of data we did collect is yet to be conducted. Further information can be found in the Baseline Report. In the LLNOB countries, COVID-19 has had a very significant impact on Christian Aid's capacity to build on the project, and it is not yet clear what activities for 2021 will look like. Other non-project challenges include consistencies in gathering sex -and age-disaggregated data (SADD) data across Christian Aid as well as utilising what has been collected. In some security/cultural contexts, it has been challenging or not possible to collect disaggregated data we would like and therefore double counting issues arise as well as not being able to analyse the data in fine detail. |
